Tips for Voting in 2018

Follow these basic rules to vote in the 2018 Primary:

- Register by Apr. 13 or during Early Voting at any Early Voting location in your county.
- 2. Vote early! If you wait until Election Day, go to your own precinct's poll.
- No photo ID is needed to vote, but new voters should read #8 inside.

- 4. Register by April 13 to vote in the Primary. Forms are at libraries or ncsbe.gov. If you register and skip an election, you're still registered; but register again if you move. Check your status at NCVoter.org.
- 5. Use Same-Day Registration if you miss the April 13 deadline. Go to an Early Voting site, fill out the form and show 1 of these with your name & address: any government document, pay stub, utility bill, bank statement, or student ID plus a school document showing your address. E-copies of these documents are ok!
 - 6. Students. You may register at a campus address if you view it as home OR at another address where you intend to return. A 17-year old who will be 18 on Nov. 6 can register and vote for candidates now, but may not vote on any Primary ballot measures.
 - 7. Past Conviction? In NC, you can register like a new voter after completing a felony sentence, including any probation or parole time. No extra document is needed. A civil fine, restitution, or misdemeanor doesn't block your right to vote.

- 8. ID Rules. You do NOT need to show an ID to vote except if you use sameday registration (see #5) or if you are a new voter in the county and your voter registration was not fully verified. In that case, you'll need to show one of the documents in #5 or any current photo ID.
- Vote Early to avoid possible last-minute problems. Early Voting is Apr. 19 to May 5. See NCVoter.org or call your county elections board for Early Voting hours and places.
- 10. Election Day. Polls open 6:30am-7:30pm. Vote at your precinct's poll, not an Early Voting location. For help, call 888-OUR-VOTE. Lines are longest 7-9am and 4-7:30pm.
- 11. Vote by Mail. Any voter may do this. See demnc.co/mail for a request form and the rules. Follow them carefully. The request must be received (not just mailed) by May 1.

- 12. Straight-Party Voting is not available. Mark your choice in each race. Flip the ballot over. Review your own ballot at NCVoter.org.
- 13. Helpful Aid. Take a list on paper or your cellphone to help remember your choices. No photos are allowed inside, not even a selfie! If you mess up the ballot, ask for a new one.
- 14. Assist Others. A near family member may help you vote. Voters with a disability or difficulty reading may get help from anyone except their employer or union agent.
- 15. Safety Net. If you go the wrong precinct on Election Day or have any problem at the poll, you have the right to vote with a provisional ballot and to learn if it counted.
