# Acceptable Photo IDs for Voting in 2020

# NC Driver's License or NC Non-Operator Card Issued by DMV\*



\*Must not be expired OR expired for one year or less

#### Driver's License or Non-Operator Card from Other State, D.C. or US Territory\*



\*Voter must have registered in NC within 90 days of the election.

#### Approved NC College/Community College or University Student ID\*



\*No expiration date is required in 2020. Visit nevoter.org for approved Student IDs.

## Military ID Card or Veterans ID Card\*



\*May be expired or have no expiration date

Beginning in 2020, North Carolina voters will be asked to provide photo ID when voting in-person or by mail, with some exceptions. *(Turn over for how to vote without a photo ID in 2020.)* 

# **NC Voter ID Card\***



\*Must not be expired OR expired for one year or less \*Get it at your county BOE

#### **Tribal Enrollment Card\***



\*Must be issued by a federally-recognized or state-approved tribe

#### Approved State/Local Government or Charter School Employee ID\*



\*No expiration date is required in 2020. Visit nevoter.org for approved IDs.

## **U.S. Passport or Passport Card\***



\*Must not be expired OR expired for one year or less

#### For voters age 65 and older:

You may use any photo ID listed above that has been expired for any length of time, provided the ID expired after your 65th birthday.

# How to Vote Without Photo ID in 2020

If you have a photo ID, take it to the polls. **If you don't, you can still vote.** 

All registered voters\* will be allowed to vote with or without a photo ID. You can vote with a provisional ballot if you do not have acceptable photo ID. A provisional ballot will count if:

- You bring an acceptable photo ID to the county board of elections (BOE) by the day of canvass — typically 10 days after Election Day; OR
- 2. You sign an affidavit when you vote declaring you have a qualifying exception from the requirement to show photo ID to vote.\*

# \*Exceptions to Vote Without Photo ID in 2020:

- You have a "reasonable impediment" that prevents you from presenting a photo ID when you vote in person or from enclosing a copy of your ID when you vote absentee by mail. Types of impediments include:
  - ➔ lack of transportation
  - ➔ disability or illness
  - → lack of birth certificate or other necessary documents
  - → work schedule
  - ➔ family responsibilities
  - $\rightarrow$  lost or stolen ID
  - $\rightarrow$  photo ID applied for but not yet received
- Southave a religious objection to being photographed; or
- You survived a natural disaster occurring within 100 days of the election.
