WE PROTECTED VOTER FREEDOMS IN 2021

Manuel "Manny" Mejia Diaz is no stranger to voter suppression in the South. Since 2019, he has served as Democracy NC's Southeast Regional Managing Organizer and advocates for pro-democracy policy in his hometown of Fayetteville. He believes in the power of his community.

In 2021, the "Vote Yes Fayetteville" campaign began as an attempt to dilute Black voting power by restructuring Fayetteville's City Council. If approved, the initiative would dramatically weaken the power of Black and brown voters and would ultimately prevent working-class people from holding local office. Ever since these anti-voter efforts came to light, Manny and his team of Southeast Advo-cates have worked diligently on a "Vote NO Fayetteville" Campaign to stop this initiative from making it on the ballot.

"Our campaign is a grassroots effort utilizing coalition spaces, speaking at churches, writing op eds for the newspaper...the beauty of the campaign is that it has organically progressed to something much larger, engaging more people. We want to reach people who vote in municipal elections and connect with young voters so they understand the historical and political context as well."

OUR 2021 IMPACT



We stalled all attacks on voter freedoms in North Carolina.

State legislatures across the country introduced over 400 anti-voter bills, nearly a dozen of which were introduced in the North Carolina General Assembly. All of these bills were successfully defeated thanks to the hard work of our staff and volunteers.

We stopped voter suppression and defended the right to protest.

Our state already had laws on the books to address property damage. House Bill 805, touted as a check on civil disobedience, was actually a backlash against the Black Lives Matter movement. Had it been implemented, hundreds of protesters would have been subject to felony charges and lost their right to vote. This legislation was a clear attack on the people of North Carolina and the racial justice movement.

We coordinated 500+ election advocates across 25 counties.

Through the Elections Advocacy program, advocates across the state were trained to serve as resident watchdogs of county boards and the State Board of Elections. They attended public hearings, submitted online petitions, and made critical public comments in the redistricting process. Democracy NC formally advocated for state funding of the county boards of elections in predominantly vulnerable regions of the state.

We distributed 120,000+ voter guides and resources to the public.

Our regional voter guides were delivered across the state to inform voters about which candidates, initiatives, and potential outcomes would affect them most in their local elections.

We recruited 21 young leaders from across the state.

In Democracy Summer's 22nd year, we trained the next generation of North Carolina's leaders. Students across the state's community colleges, HBCUs, and universities advocated against voter disenfranchisement in their communities and educated the public on issues that affected their daily lives.

We collaborated with 150+ organizations across North Carolina.

Together, we pushed for a better redistricting process, advocating for legislators to center public participation and transparency. We issued clear demands to the General Assembly about conducting a community districting process that was fair, transparent, and accessible to the public.

We mobilized 10,000+ advocates to take action in 2021.

Our skilled Regional Managing Organizers engaged advocates in five regions across the state to contact their lawmakers, give public testimony, monitor Boards of Elections, and much more to protect democracy in 2021.

After completing her studies, Kel joined Democracy NC as an Organizing Assistant for the Western Piedmont Region. Since that time, she has played an integral role in the organization's outreach to Black, Latine, Asian American and Pacific Islander, and Indigenous communities across the state and has successfully advocated for pro-voter provisions at the local level.

As a fierce advocate for social justice, Kel has worked tirelessly to increase voter engagement in her community and to better understand the needs and challenges that face the people of North Carolina.

"I have been involved with Democracy NC for more years than I can count.

In my time, I have helped support my Eastern NC neighbors by registering students to vote, protesting at Moral Monday events, and advocating for fair elections. I have served as a Democracy NC Advocate for the Pitt County Board of Elections and I have traveled to the General Assembly to address legislators about the needs of my community. I am especially motivated to protect Sunday Early Voting and work with local organizations to encourage people to vote.

In recent years, I have focused on the U.S. Census, ensuring that as many people as possible are counted and represented in the redistricting process. Participating at the state and local levels of government — whether that be going to BOE meetings, speaking in front of the NCGA, or simply voting — can make a significant difference. That's what it means to me, to be part of this grassroots organization."

"We first became involved with Democracy NC in 2014 through volunteering with our local chapter of the NAACP.

We have always felt that working on the ground in our community is the most effective way to affect positive social change. It is so important for local progressive groups to work together to achieve their mutual goals. Democracy NC's election education materials are critical for the public to understand and respond to the ongoing challenges that our elections face. Since 2016, we have served as Vote Protectors through Democracy NC. We have canvassed at countless events and reached out to as many donors as we can.
